Scholar, professor, makes time for canvas

Despite teaching art history, humanities and English and writing scholarly books and articles on art history and culture, Sharon Worley produces a body of artwork that she says is "annually consistent with a full-time art-

She creates original paintings that she sells through her website, www.sharonworleypaintings.com.

A portion of her work is inspired by the environmental movement. Overall, she creates abstract and impressionistic seascapes and landscapes with acrylic on canvas that are largely inspired by nature and late 19th-century and early 20th-century art

2013," aims to stimulate "creative thought about the environmental crises caused by the depletion of the ozone layer and chemical pollutants."

She said the series was inspired by the effects of Hurricane Ike in Galveston Bay and the British Petroleum oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. The titles of the paintings, she said, "suggest the tradition of scientific and mythical vovages of Charles Darwin aboard the Beagle, and Odysseus' voyages terminating at Ithaca, and Jason and the Argonauts."

"Science, myth and art combine to increase public awareness through education," she said. "We

must question whether our decisions made from the perspective of a child's game will terminate in future flirtations with catastrophe."

Worley said she's practically a lifelong artist, starting when she was 10 years old, earning a scholarship to the Columbus School of Art and Design when she was in fifth grade.

Today, she still enjoys the creativity of art. She said her most memorable recent piece was called "Global Currents," a work that consisted of four 36-by-72-inch "environmentally-conscious" panels that depicted ocean currents. They were shown as part of a solo exhibition at the Houston Public Library's McKinney branch in 2010.

This year and last, she said she painted two series of canvases depicting volcanoes, work that was based on trips she took to Naples, Italy, and Honolulu.

New beginnings are achieved for women overcoming substance abuse problems at a special county correctional facility in Atascocita. Female volunteers play vital roles in this process by

befriending and supporting these women through semi-monthly one-hour visits, telephone contact, letters and participation in workshops. Volunteer should be at least 21 years of age and willing to commit to a one year involvement. Comprehensive training is provided.
